Ed calls it the "shop center," and the only real scheduled class is the auto-mechanics class which meets only one morning every week with Ed. Ed is in the shop center all day every Tuesday for people to come in. The other class is with Chris and that is on Fridays. There are the regular people who come in all the time, and then there are the ones that come in randomly whenever they get the chance, but almost anyone is welcome considering there is no age restriction. Chris says "its more of an interest thing" so with that said, if you're serious and you're not goofing around you can take shop class.

The kind of machines used in the shop center are the wire feed welder, the lathe, an oxy-acetylen torch, a bench grinder, jigsaws, a narrow belt sander, and a drill press. These are just some of the machines.

Tools used in the shop center are axes, saws, screwdrivers, hammers, bits, sanders, and handsaws. These are also just a few of the hand tools used. There is also an array of extension cords, scrap metal and wood, and of course, shop goggles for safety.

The kinds of things made in the shop center are wood animals, all kinds of toys, wind chimes, outdoor fireplaces, animal cages, knives, forks, bookends, objects made from bottle caps, tables, illicit walking sticks (fighting devices) and Dusty is even welding a skate rail.
